How to Participate: Daisies and Brownies complete 3 of 5 steps, Juniors and Cadettes complete 4 of 5 steps, and Seniors and Ambassadors complete all 5 steps. Step 1 is required for all levels.

- 5. Participate in Girl Scout Week


Each month will contain both research and activities which will need to be completed to earn the patch.

Ready to go ALL IN? Order all your monthly patches at once! The All-In order is \$30 and is due October 15. Patches will still be mailed out on a monthly basis but this option allows you to order all patches up front at the beginning of the year.

Patch orders are due the 15th of the following month. For example, October's patch registration is due November 15th. Each patch is custom designed and will be mailed out roughly 8-10 weeks after the order is due. Individual patches are \$3 each.

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Create a Kaper Chart

A kaper is a job or chore that must be done. In Girl Scouting, a kaper chart indicates all the jobs available and who is responsible for each one. In other words, a kaper chart is a way of dividing the jobs so that each girl has a part. Design your own Kaper chart for either your troop, a campout, or to use at home.

To make a kaper chart, first decide:

- 1. Which kapers should be divided (e.g. there are different capers for camp vs. meetings vs. field trips).
- 2. Whether the kapers should be handled by groups or individuals.
- 3. If choosing groups, decide on group size.
- 4. What type or style of chart to use.
- 5. How to rotate the groups.

Kaper Options for Groups

Opening: Choose the lead and the opening. Will it be a flag ceremony, favorite game or song, the Promise, or any other ideas?

Business Assistants:

Pass out and collect papers, take attendance, collect dues.

<u>Passers:</u> Pass out any supplies during the meeting.

<u>Clean up:</u> Everyone clean, but these girls make sure it gets done.

Closing: Choose and lead the closing. Will it be a song, talking about living the Promise, the Friendship Circle?

Kaper Options for Individuals

Opening Kapers

- Promise Leader
- Law Leader
- Flag Holder (s)
- Flag Ceremony
- Bridge of Silence (2)these girls make a bridge prior to the flag ceremony and when the other girls pass underneath, they stop talking.

Business Kapers

- Secretary- attendance
- Treasurer dues

Miscellaneous Kapers

- Line leader– hands out craft supplies
- Game girl- Chooses a game
- Song singer chooses a song
- Share bear gets to tell a story of their choice.

Snack Kapers

 Bring/Pass out snacks and drinks

Clean Up Kapers

- Push in chairs or stack them
- Queen of Clean- cleans up after snack
- Kaper Keeper- move kaper assignments at the next meeting

Closing Kapers

- Friendship Fairystarts the friendship squeeze
- Out Scout Troop closing ceremony

Keep in mind that kaper groups allow leaders to mix the girls in different ways. Typically, groups would stay together for a few times and then are mixed up again. Sometimes girls are rotated more often to give them an opportunity to meet lots of different girls. Sometimes groups use a combination of kaper charts for different functions: e.g. one for groups splitting major jobs, one for flag ceremony jobs.

Make S.W.A.P.S.

SWAPs are small tokens of friendship that girls exchange with other Girl Scouts they meet. They come in handy when you meet a lot of different troops during events like World Thinking Day, summer camps, and when you travel with your troop. Try out one of the SWAPS below or find one you really like. Then find someone to SWAP with!

SWAPS originated from the Native American "Potlatch" which is a ceremonial exchange of gifts.



Materials:

- Felt
- String
- Pins
- Pipe Cleaners
- Permanent Markers
- Paper

Instructions:

- 1. Cut out a piece of felt that is 2" x 4.5" inches.
- 2. Roll the felt and secure by twisting two small pieces of pipe cleaner around the ends.
- 3. Feed the string through to create a hanger for the bedroll swap.
- 4. Write your troop number and state on the side of the bedroll, or by adding a paper tag.
- 5. Stick a pin through on layer of felt.

Materials:

- Mini baggies
- Star sequins
- Pins
- Paper

Instructions:

- 1. Print out small pieces of paper with the text in the image to the right.
- 2. Put the star sequins and paper inside the mini baggies.
- 3. Put the pin through the mini baggie.





Materials:

- Silver/Gold Pipe cleaners
- Silver/Gold beads
- Silver/Gold rings

Instructions:

- 1. Print out small pieces of paper with "Make New Friends" lyrics.
- 2. Paint puzzle pieces silver and gold.
- 3. Glue the puzzle pieces to the paper.
- 4. Put the pin through the paper.

Optional

You can use pipe cleaners, beads, or rings in place of the puzzle pieces.

Plan a Girl Scout Ceremony

With more than 11 different ceremonies to choose from, plan out your own Girl Scout ceremony for the year. Find something that is unique to your troop and incorporate it into the ceremony to make it even more special!

The Girl Scout sign and the quiet sign are not the same. The Girl Scout sign raises 3 fingers and the quiet sign raises all 5 fingers.

Ceremonies help Girl Scouts celebrate special moments and accomplishments throughout the year, such as bridging to another level or earning a National Leadership Journey award. Girl Scouts can plan a ceremony around a theme, such as friendship or nature, and express themselves in words or song.

- Bridging ceremonies mark a girl's move from one level of Girl Scouting to another.
- **Flag ceremonies** can be part of any activity that honors the American flag. Be sure to observe flag etiquette during a flag ceremony.
- A Fly-Up is a bridging ceremony for Girl Scout Brownies bridging to Girl Scout Juniors. Girls receive the Girl Scout pin along with their Brownie wings.
- A Girl Scout Bronze, Silver, or Gold Award ceremony honors Girl Scouts who have earned these special awards and is usually held at the troop/group level or combined with council recognition.
- **Girl Scouts' Own** is a girl-planned program that lets girls explore their feelings around a topic, such as friendship or the Girl Scout Promise and Law, using spoken word, favorite songs, poetry, or other forms of expression. It is never a religious ceremony.
- Investiture welcomes new members into the Girl Scout family for the first time. New Girl Scouts receive their membership pin as well as their grade-level pin at this ceremony.
- **Journey ceremonies** honor Girl Scouts who have earned the final award in a Journey. The ceremonies are usually held at the troop/group level and invite Girl Scouts to develop a themed celebration of their Journey, often including friends and family.
- A Court of Awards ceremony honors Girl Scouts' accomplishments. They are presented with their badges, year pins, and other recognitions earned during the year. Volunteers may also be recognized during the ceremony. The Court of Awards can be held anytime during the year, at any location, and as often as the troop wants.
- Opening ceremonies can kick off regular Girl Scout meetings and make them feel special!
- Pinning ceremonies help celebrate when girls receive grade-level Girl Scout pins.
- Rededication ceremonies are an opportunity for Girl Scouts, their families, and volunteers to renew their commitment to the Girl Scout Promise and Law.

Participate in Girl Scout Week

On March 12 we celebrate Girl Scouts' birthday, when Juliette Gordon Low officially registered the first 18 girl members in Savannah, Georgia of 1912. Actually, we celebrate the whole week! Girl Scout Week starts on a Sunday and ends with Girl Scout Sabbath on Saturday, always including Girl Scouts' birthday.
